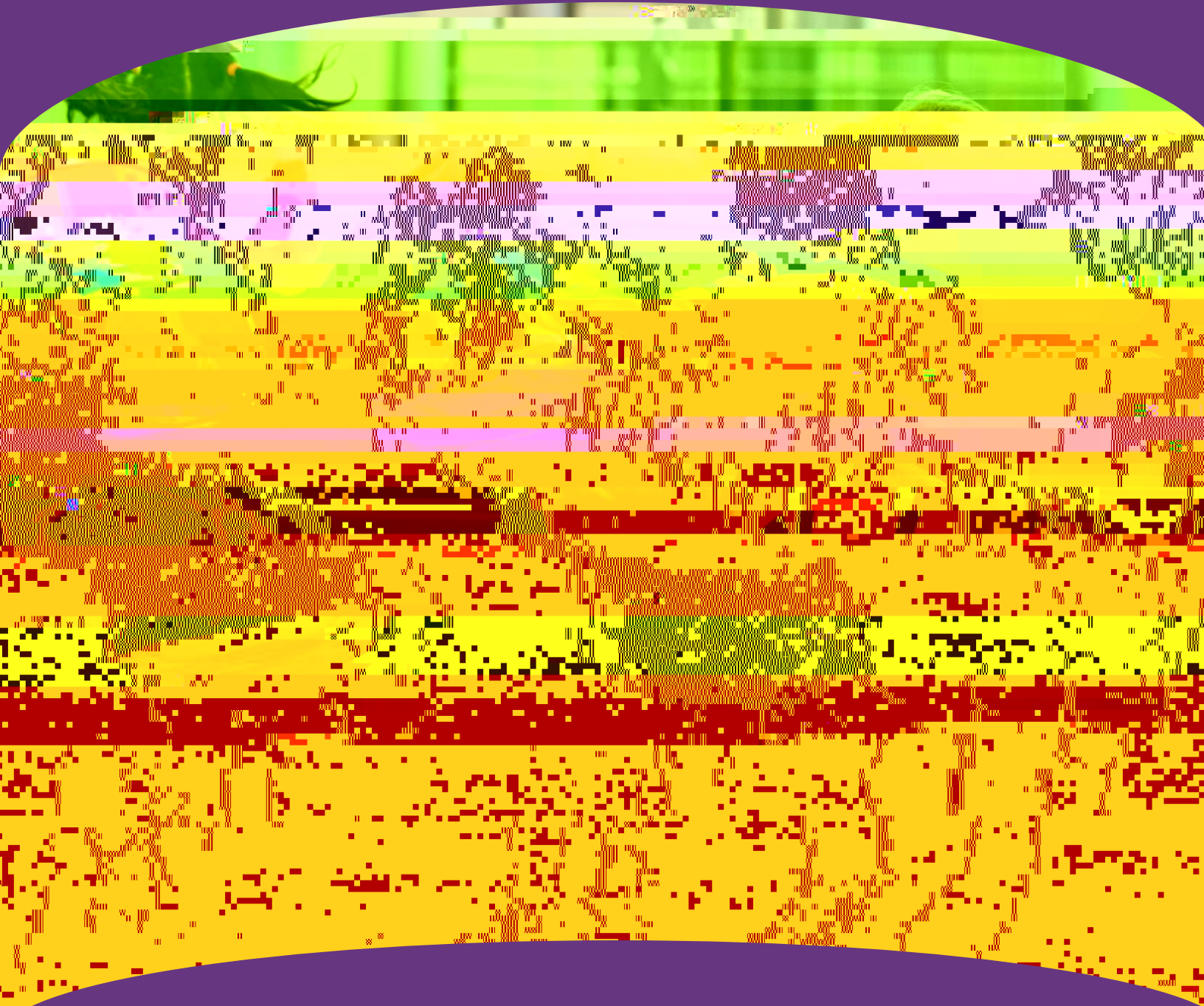

Notice of Procedural Safeguards Rights of Parents of Children with Disabilities

The Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), as amended in 2004, requires schools to provide parents of a child with a disability with a notice containing a full explanation of the procedural safeguards available under IDEA and its implementing regulations. This document, produced by the Texas Education Agency (TEA), is intended to meet this notice requirement and help parents of children with disabilities understand their rights under IDEA.

Procedural Safeguards in Special Education

Under IDEA, the term parent means a biological parent, an adoptive parent, a foster parent who meets state requirements, a guardian, an individual acting in the place of a biological or adoptive parent including a grandparent, stepparent, or other relative with whom the child lives, an individual who is legally responsible for the child, or a surrogate parent.

The term native language when used with someone who has limited English proficiency means the language normally used by that person.

To be eligible to serve as a surrogate parent, you must not be an employee of the school, or any agency that is involved in the education or care of the child, and you must not have any interest that conflicts with the interest of the child. A person appointed as a surrogate parent must have adequate knowledge and skills, be willing to serve, exercise

attend ARD committee meetings, and complete a training program. The person appointed by a school to act as a surrogate parent must complete the training program before

later than the 90th day after the date of initial appointment as a surrogate parent.

Procedures When Disciplining Children with Disabilities

Authority of School Personnel

Case-by-Case Determination

School personnel may consider any unique circumstances on a case-by-case basis when determining whether a change of placement, made in accordance with the following requirements related to discipline, is appropriate for a child with a disability who violates a school code of student conduct.

General

To the extent that they also take such action for children without disabilities, school personnel may, for not more than 10 school days in a

Nothing in IDEA limits the rights, procedures, and remedies available

However, the court may not reduce fees if it finds that the school or the state unreasonably delayed the final resolution of the action or proceeding or there was a violation under the procedural safeguards provisions of IDEA Part B.
